event. Do you send a lot of emails? A tag line can be inserted automatically on every email you send. In Outlook Express, under Tools, Options, Signatures a text area is provided to insert a message. Other email servers will have different paths but basically provide a similar service. A sample tag line could be **Winnipeg - Home of the Royal\*2013\*Royale**.

Most of us buy supplies and philatelic items from time to time. Ask the dealer if they are planning to attend the Royal in Winnipeg in 2013. It initially plants the seed in the dealer's mind and if enough members ask, the dealer will see that attendance the show may be a good business opportunity.

## Christmas Island

(Part 2 of Island Hopping)

Wikipedia can be a very excellent source of information and I continue the South Sea Island tour.

Christmas Island is located in the Indian Ocean at latitude 10°30' south and longitude 105°40' east. It is approximately 380 km south of Java Head at the southern entrance to the Sunda Strait approximately 1,350 km from Singapore and approximately 2,650 km from Perth. The nearest point of the Australian mainland is Northwest Cape, which lies approximately 1,565 km to the southeast. The Island has an area of 135 sq. km.

### The postage stamps and postal history of

**Christmas Island**, in the Indian Ocean, was linked to its original economic situation until 1993.

Mainly ruled by a phosphate production commission, the island was part of the British Strait Settlements colony from 1901 to 1942, then of Singapore from 1946 to 1958. Although it was placed under Australian control in 1958, the island remained postally and philatelically independent until 1993 when Australia Post became the island's postal operator.

The island issued its own postage stamps from 1958. Those issued by Australia Post since 1993 are also valid in Australia, as are Australian stamps in Christmas Island.

According to the Stanley Gibbons stamp catalogue 32 stamps

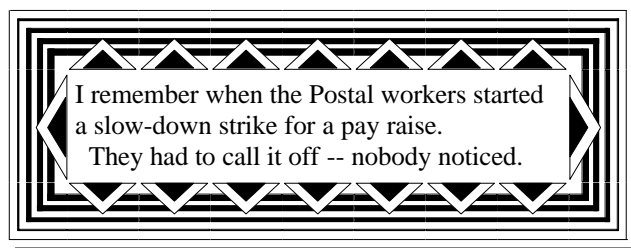
Bert Brady is asking for donations to the WAG stamp sale. He is looking for cancels and Christmas seals.

were issued when postal responsibility was exercised by the Phosphate Commission between 1958 and 1969, and 335 under the responsibility of the Christmas Island Administration between 1969 and 1993. From March 1993 to February 2003, during its ten first years of postal responsibility, Australia Post issued 153 stamps for Christmas Island.

Christmas Island was annexed by the United Kingdom in 1888 and exploited by the Christmas Island Phosphate Company since 1899 with European employees and Malayan and Chinese workers. A post agency was opened in 1901, managed by the District Officer, the representative of the Straits Settlements colony on the island. The agency sold stamps of this colony, figuring the British monarch.



Mail traveled between Christmas Island and Singapore with cargo and migrant workers by the ships commanded by the company. Most of the small amount of mail was sent and received by the European part of the population.

During World War II, the Japanese forces invaded the island on 31 March 1942. After the British forces liberated Christmas Island, British Military Administration overprinted stamps of Malaya were in use in the island. The civil postal agency was reopened by the end of 1946.



After these events, the local postal system followed the political changes in British Malaya. Administratively linked to Singapore in April 1946, Christmas Island received this colony's stamps in 1948, but the mail was transported by the Pan Malayan Postal Union.

## Postal independence under Australian administration

### 1958-1959 transition

While Singapore prepared its accession to self-government, the United Kingdom decided to transfer Christmas Island administration to Australia, a country which had been controlling along with New Zealand the phosphate company, the British Phosphate Commission, since 1948. The Australian Christmas Island Act accepted the continuity of the Singapore legal system in the island, including the postal system. The Malayan dollar remained the currency because of the needs of Southeast Asian workers. Consequently, the island's postal system was independent from Australia's and placed under the responsibility of the Christmas Island Phosphate Commission. Inhabitants could collect their mail at the post office in Flying Fish Cove. For outgoing mail, specific postage stamps would be issued even if the Australian Department of Territories asked the Australian post office to produce them. Postal rates remained those of Singapore, placing this State inside the interior rate zone of Christmas Island.

However, two modifications were made on the Singapore postal system in Christmas Island: the airmail postage rate to Australia was reduced and Australian canceling stamps were sent in 1958 with the designation: "CHRISTMAS ISLAND / INDIAN OCEAN / AUST".

The first philatelic issue was released on 15 October 1958. It was an adaptation of Australia's 1 shilling 7 pence stamp of March 1955, using a *bas-relief* profile of Queen Elizabeth II by W.L. Bowles with floral ornament. The design by F.D. Manley was reshaped by engraver G. Lissenden to include a black "CHRISTMAS ISLAND" and encircled value in Malayan dollars overprint.

The face values and part of the chosen colours were inspired by the last definitive stamps of Singapore in use in Christmas Island. Stamps were printed in recess for the effigy and the word "Australia" and in typography for the overprint by the Note Printing Branch of the Commonwealth Bank in Melbourne. The philatelic office in Melbourne, in charge of the Australian Territories stamp sales, delivered one hundred stamp sheets to the Phosphate Commission which expedited them to the island by ship sailing from Fremantle. The same royal effigy served for the registered postal stationery issued on 18 May 1959.

### Under the Phosphate Commission's postal responsibility

The map of Christmas Island, its major toponyms and the phosphate-mining railway were the subject of the 2-cent stamp issued in 1963.

The first stamps were viewed as a temporary issue, but it took five years to produce the next series. Under supervision of the Department of Territories, the Stamp Advisory Committee and representatives of the island, the Australian Post Office and Note Printing Branch's artists and printers worked on the project from

# INTERNATIONAL YEAR OF ASTRONOMY

2009 has been a great year to look up at the stars. Canada Post has produced a souvenir sheet (including an overprint on some) and 2 stamps to celebrate the International Year of Astronomy.

In Europe 'Astronomy' was chosen by PostEurop to be the theme for the Europa 2009 stamp issue following a request from the International Astronomical Union's Commission for History of Astronomy which, in 2009, will be celebrating the 400th anniversary of Galileo's first telescopic observatory.

photographs taken on the island presenting its flora, fauna and mining industry. Finally, ten stamps were scheduled, drawn and engraved by G. Lissenden, Peter Morris and Bruce Stewart. They were issued on 28 August 1963.

Two years later, the island participated in the omnibus issue for the 50th anniversary of the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps landing in Gallipoli during World War I.

These two issues bore the designation "CHRISTMAS ISLAND" without any reference to Australia like the new canceling datestamps on which the "AUST" abbreviation disappeared. Nonetheless, on 6 May 1968, the monetary and postal systems of Christmas Island were brought closer to the Australian ones: the Malayan dollar was replaced by the Australian dollar and the Australian Post and Telegraphs Act came into force. Local adaptations remained possible, like the localization in Western Australia of Christmas Island to calculate the postal rates, and the special low rate for letters to Malaysia and Singapore.

A third definitive issue was released on 6 May 1968 too, depicting Indian Ocean fish. This zoological topic was proposed as early as 1966 by the Christmas Island representatives for the second series, who approved artist George Hamori's designs. But the twelve stamps were not issued until 1968 in order to coincide with the monetary change. The designation "CHRISTMAS ISLAND / INDIAN OCEAN" appeared for the first time on these 1968 stamps and remained in use until 1993.



## Under the local administration's responsibility

On 1 February 1969, postal responsibility on the island was transmitted by the Phosphate Commission to the Christmas Island Administration. It quickly created a philatelic office and in 1971 chose an agent for sale in the rest of the world, the Crown Agents. The stamp program was then decided locally, produced with the Agents' expertise and printed by specialized printers in Europe, and in Australia starting in the late 1980s.

The philatelic program did not surpass four issues per year. The major topics were local: fauna and flora, local history (political, economical and daily life). Christmas became an annual topic from the 1970s due to the name of the island, with some gaps around 1990: the seasonal issue was replaced by minisheets announcing international philatelic exhibitions.

The ships exporting phosphate to Australia or the liners to Singapore moved mail. In June 1974, the mail transportation took advantage of the establishment of new regular air services between the island, Perth and Singapore.

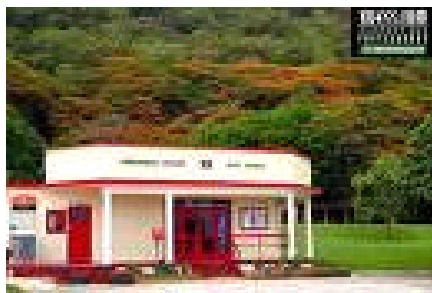
## Australian Postal Territory

At the beginning of the 1990s, Australia decided to impose full Australian legislation to Christmas Island. In postal matters, starting 2 March 1993, Australia Post became the postal operator of the island and responsible for its philatelic program. Consequently, Christmas Island stamps issued after March 1993 were usable in Australia, and Australian stamps in Christmas Island.

On 4 March 1993 the first five Australia Post stamps were issued with a new designation: "CHRISTMAS ISLAND / AUSTRALIA". The philatelic program topics remained limited. Australia Post promised three issues per year: [13] a Christmas stamp that was issued every two years during the 2000s, a Chinese New Year stamp since 1995 (later a twelve stamp issue after 2002) and one issue on local life.

The exciting lineup includes captivating snapshots of Canadian wildlife, a bold new addition to the Lunar New Year series, and some special Olympic issues, to name a few. We're currently working on our 2011 and 2012 programs, so now is the time to send us your suggestions.

### JANUARY

#### FLAGS OVER HISTORIC MILLS

Since the first European settlements, mills have heavily influenced Canada's social and economic development, and were often the foundation upon which thriving communities were built. Next year, we'll celebrate these picturesque links to our past with five definitive stamps featuring historic Canadian mills: Keremeos Grist Mill (Keremeos, BC), Watson's Mill (Manotick, ON), the Old Stone Mill National Historic Site (Delta, ON), Cornell Mill (Stanbridge East, QC), and the Riordon Grist Mill (Caraquet, NB).

#### QUEN ELIZABETH II

Monarchs have always had their place on Canada's definitive stamps. Next year's PERMANENT™ stamp will feature a photograph of Queen Elizabeth II taken during her last official visit.

#### ORCHIDS

Orchids are known and loved around the world for their fabulous, flaring petals and sweet, sensuous aromas. Watch for four new stamps featuring orchids that grow in Canada.

#### LUNAR NEW YEAR: YEAR OF THE TIGER

Canada Post will ring in the Lunar New Year with two stamps that honour 2010 as the Year of the Tiger—the second issue of the twelve-year series.

#### VAN COUVER 2010 COMEMORATIVE ISSUE

All eyes are on Canada as the nation prepares to host the Vancouver 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games. This exciting and dynamic world-class event will be celebrated with a commemorative stamp issue.

### FEBRUARY

#### WILIAM HAL

To celebrate Black History Month, and in conjunction with the 100th anniversary of the Canadian Navy, Canada Post will honour an African-Canadian naval member who risked his life to safeguard our future. Nova Scotia-born William Hall (1827-1904) was the son of freed American slaves. He volunteered for the Royal Navy, was decorated in the Crimean War, and became the first Black person, the first Nova Scotian, and one of the first Canadians to receive the Victoria Cross, the British Empire's highest award for bravery.

#### VAN COUVER 2010 OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES: CLOSING CEREMONY

As the Games draw to a close, Canada Post will salute the world's athletes and celebrate Canada's victories with a special commemorative issue.

### MARCH

#### AFRICAN VIOLETS

The African Violet, a perennial beauty famous for its blue- to-violet flowers and velvety heart-shaped leaves will bloom on two stamps.

### APRIL

#### ART CANADA: PRUDENCE HEWARD, 1896-1947

In an age that favoured landscape painting and gave little credibility to the female artist, Prudence Heward made a name for herself as a figure painter. She was a member of Canada's renowned Beaver Hall Group, the Contemporary Arts Society, and the Canadian Group of Painters.

### MAY

#### CANADIAN NAVY, 100TH ANNIVERSARY

With more than 240,000 km of coastline, the safeguarding of Canada's borders has always been a vital concern. The Canadian Navy protects our country from threats as diverse as terrorism, illegal resource exploitation, pollution violations, narcotics trafficking and illegal immigration. In 2010, we'll commemorate their 100 years of service to our country with two stamps.

#### SWEDEN/CANADA JOINT ISSUE: MARINE WILDLIFE

What do Canada and Sweden have in common? A spectacular array of marine wildlife! To celebrate our shared natural diversity, we'll partner with the Swedish Post for a joint issue showcasing two creatures that roam our coastal waters: a

sea otter and a harbour porpoise.

### JUNE

#### CANADIAN GEOGRAPHIC WILDLIFE PHOTOGRAPHY CONTEST

Canada's wildlife scene is one of endless fascination. In 2010, we'll showcase its beauty and diversity with a stamp issue featuring the winning snapshots of *Canadian Geographic's* Wildlife Photography Contest.

#### ROTARY INTERNATIONAL in Canada, 100TH ANNIVERSARY

It began as a small social club meant to capture the friendly spirit of small-town America, and has since grown into one of the largest and most successful volunteer service organizations in the world. We'll celebrate Rotary International's centenary in Canada with a stamp.

### JULY

#### ROADSIDE ATTRACTIONS

Our cross-Canada road trip continues with four new stamps featuring Canadian roadside attractions: Coffee Pot and Cup (Davidson, SK), Happy Rock (Gladstone, MB), Wawa Goose (Wawa, ON), and Puffin (Longue-Pointe-de-Mingan, QC).

#### GIRL GUIDES OF CANADA, 100TH ANNIVERSARY

Famous for their much-loved cookies, the Girl Guides of Canada are getting ready to celebrate 100 years of camping, crafting, and friendship. Canada Post will honour this girl-empowering movement with a stamp.

### AUGUST

#### CUPIDS, 400TH ANNIVERSARY

Located at the heart of Conception Bay in eastern Newfoundland and Labrador, Cupids (originally known as Cupers Cove) was the site of the first English settlement in what would become Canada and the second in North America. In 2010, we celebrate the 400th anniversary of this historical event.

#### BLUE WHALE

Widely believed to be the largest animal of all time, the majestic Blue Whale will appear on a \$10 high-value definitive stamp.

### SEPTEMBER

#### FOUR INDIAN KINGS

In 1710, four Chiefs of the Iroquoian Confederacy journeyed to England to pay a diplomatic visit to Queen Anne. This was one of first negotiations between the Canadian Crown and the First Nations. To commemorate this visit, their portraits were commissioned by the Queen. The *Four Kings* hung in Kensington Palace until 1977, when Queen Elizabeth II donated them to the Canadian Collection at the National Archives of Canada. Next year, they'll be featured on a set of stamps.

### OCTOBER

#### HOME CHILDREN

From 1869 to the 1930s, close to 100,000 children were shipped to Canada from Britain's slums and orphanages, to be used as cheap domestic labour. As their "homes" weren't monitored after placement, they were all susceptible to, and most were subjected to, grave mistreatment. This massive wave of immigration, little known to most Canadians, has left a significant mark on our nation's social fabric. In 2010, a stamp issue will honour the courage and perseverance of the Home Children who came to Canada.

### NOVEMBER

#### CHRISTMAS ORNAMENTS

Bells and baubles will capture the warmth and spirit of the holiday season on three new Christmas stamps.

#### NATIVIT Y SCENE

The Nativity scene has been captured in works of art from around the world since the Middle Ages. In 2010, Canada Post will add to this sacred tradition with a stamp featuring the Nativity.
