Für die Jugend, Pro Juventute, For Youth By Alf Brooks

Pro Juventute was founded in 1912 at Olten, Switzerland by the Societé Suisse d'utilité publicque. "Its principal objective was to awaken and strengthen in parents, educators, authorities, and the general population a feeling of responsibility toward young people." More specifically, Pro Juventute worked to unite the efforts of organizations that aimed to help youth; in 1912 there were more than 3000 of these in Switzerland. The organizations were inspired to work together with PJ to coordinate their activities and to generate new ideas. At its beginning SSUP endowed PJ with five million francs, enabling PJ to organize, divided into geographical districts. However, PJ soon decided that its principal source of revenue would be from the sale of tangible objects rather than from solicitations. Over the years it has sold a number of items:

- Telegrams for Special Occasions. One bought an artistically decorated message sheet and a special envelope, with a surtax going to PJ.
- Special postcards illustrated by Swiss artists.
- Miniature official New Year's letters with decorated envelopes, "Briefli."
- Books and magazines with content that would interest children.

However, PJ soon approached the Swiss Post Office, PTT, with the idea of selling special postage stamps.

The first stamps were distributed in post offices in 1912. They had no postal

validity, but the public was encouraged to buy them and affix them to their letters that had valid postage. They are listed in the Zumstein catalogue and are known as forerunners.



The first PJ stamps with franking value were sold in 1913. None were issued in 1914, but since 1915 a series of two to five stamps has been issued each year. The date of issue has been the end of November or the beginning of December, with a postal validity of a few months. Since 1964 the stamps have had unlimited validity. However, they could be used only on mail within Switzerland because of a clause in the Universal Postal Union treaty of 1909: "It is not permitted to use in international service stamps created for a special and particular purpose by the country of origin, such as those called commemoratives with only a transitory value." However, the stamps are now valid for use on international mail.

For many years the stamps pictured costumes, coats of arms or scenery, and sometimes images of Swiss personages.







More recently the stamps have pictured insects, flowers, toys, children's art and other youth-related themes..

In 1937 a miniature sheet celebrated the twenty-fifth anniversary of Pro Juventute; with the 100th anniversary approaching we

Carved from mammoth ivory, it is estimated to be at least 35 000 years old, thus predating the Willindorf Venus by 10 000 years.

In 1927 a flight was proposed from London, Ontario to London. England. On September 1 the *Sir John Carling* left London and made it to Portland, Maine on September 3 and Harbour Grace, Newfoundland on September 5. On September 7 the airplane, with pilot Captain Terrence Tully and navigator Lieutenant James Medcalf, headed east across the Atlantic Ocean; it was never seen again.



The flight carried mail with specially-sanctioned stamps. A few mint copies have been found over the years. A black and white proof recently sold at auction for US\$35,000.00 plus 18% buyer's premium at Firby Auctions.

Vestfold was north-east of St. Laurent, Manitoba. The Post Office was opened in 1895 on 36-18-3W and closed in 1957. The name is an Icelandic word meaning "western ground," applicable here since the Post Office was located on the west side of Shoal Lake.

who else reading this rode it?

Le Havre...Belgium?

The first reaction on examining this stamp and cancel is to think that someone has made a mistake, has mistakenly used a stamp from Belgium while in France, and that likely the wrong postage was not noticed. Not so.

In 1914, as the German Army overran Belgium, the many fleeing refugees included departments of the Belgian Government. Until 1918, when Belgium was freed, official functions, including regulating the post, were carried on in France. The result was this illustrated item, a Belgian stamp (Scott #95) cancelled in Le Havre in France, quite legally, in 1915. Examine the cancel and vou see, in parentheses, "Special," to accommodate the use of foreign postage in France during World War I. It is not a rare item, but does point to the situation of the time.
